A government minister is today facing accusations of taking bribes. There have been heavy hints¹ about this for some time. An article in The Moon last week clearly implied² that a top political figure was involved in a scandal and dropped a number of broad hints³ as to who it was. A leaked document⁴ published in today's Moon, however, makes a number of serious allegations⁵, which openly accuse the Minister of corruption. The Minister has issued a statement⁶, saying the claims are unfoundedⁿ. He claims that he has been wrongly accused by The Moon because of its long-running battle³ with the government.
